



Monteviot lighting

Monteviot Lights, the enchanting winter light festival set to debut soon will deliver a festive windfall for a local charity.

The event will partner Meeting of Minds to extend a helping hand to the local community and support the vital work the charity undertakes

The selection process for a charity partner was made through a public vote.

To be eligible for consideration, nominees were required to be registered with the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR) and possess a valid charity number.

All importantly, the charity was to be actively engaged in supporting and enriching the lives of communities within the Scottish Borders.

Meeting of Minds will receive a generous donation of 250 tickets for Monteviot Lights, valued at approximately £4,500. These tickets can be distributed among the people the charity serves or used to raise funds through auctions.

Meeting of Minds was formed in 2015 by a small group of like-minded and passionate mothers raising children with additional and complex needs.

The charity's reputation for dedication and hard work has gone from strength to strength every year in the local area. Those involved have created and nurtured a much-needed support network for families and carers.

Michael, the 13th Marquis of Lothian, expressed his enthusiasm for the partnership search, stating, "We not only want Monteviot Lights to be a fantastic event for families, but also want the event to be a force for good in supporting communities across the Scottish Borders.

"We are delighted to partner with Meeting of Minds, who we can work with and support. As we hope this event will be staged annually, we also hope to be able to support other worthwhile causes each year across the Borders."

Monteviot Lights, set against the natural backdrop of Monteviot Gardens promises to be captivating spectacle for families and visitors.

The light trail starts at Harestanes Visitor Centre and takes a 1.5km route through gardens and woods where creative lighting installed by experts NL Productions promises an evening of wonder and enchantment.

Wedale - Step inside a bookshop of adventurous choices

The first thing that strikes you about Wedale Bookshop in Stow is that it literally hugs you as you walk in the door and within moments you realise that it hosts a selection of books that are not only fascinatingly eclectic but entirely brave.

For 34 years Gordon MacDougall Stewart had been 'banging on' about opening a bookshop and as he nudged the half century in Spring the dream was finally achieved in partnership with Tom Parnell.

This wonderful bookshop in Stow was born and as Gordon and Tom celebrated their half year anniversary of the opening many people flooded in through the door.

So they felt then that the inspiration to transform the former architect's office into a bookshop was along the right lines.

Apart from stocking a wide selection of crime novels from established authors Gordon is striving to introduce the reader to some lesser-known writers such as the Northumbrian L J Ross. The Mrs. Bradley Mysteries by Gladys Mitchell break from the norm with a hero who is the anti Mrs. Marple, 'cackling and vulture like' and this is something he joyfully wants to share.

Wedale is the only offline stockist of crime novels by Ed James who anchors his work in the Scottish Borders. His novels are escalating in popularity for good reason and a local event held recently by Wedale to promote his work was a huge success.

Gordon has chosen subjects which have fascinated him for many years in the intriguing witchcraft and mythology section and you can sit in one of the comfy armchairs to peruse well-chosen non fiction works featuring nature, environment and climate emergency.

influenced his choice in the intriguing history section. But he has made it clear that he prefers to focus on the local area because it is often overlooked and there is so much to tell.

There is so much to explore in this bookshop

where many older books such as The Plague by Camus offer a good read. And there are Sci Fi choices away from the norm such as Gravity's Rainbow and, importantly, travel books in the shop guide the reader to places that can be reached in a sustainable way.

Countless other books are waiting to be pounced upon and the favourite armchair slouched in for perusal appears to be the one by the window overlooking the Pennywhiggham Burn.

For the younger readers Gordon revealed that many of the children and young adult choices have been recommended by customers and the couple are always open to new ideas and suggestions.

There's a moreish selection of carefully chosen gifts: ethical, sustainable and local. Many of those sourced internationally provide work to lift people out of poverty. This certainly adds to the feel good vibe about Wedale and its almost irresistible contents.

So finally - Has this reaction to a midlife crisis been worthwhile?

"Yes" is the resounding answer from Gordon. "The positive reaction makes it all worthwhile and we are looking forward to the next chapter of our bookshop adventure".

Mary Queen of Scots - a study in sadness

Would that I had died in Jedburgh.

The utter despair of a life in captivity was thus summed up by Mary Queen of Scots as she awaited her fate at Fotheringhay Castle in Northamptonshire.

She was reflecting on a short but memorable visit to the Scottish Borders town in October 1566, where, as Queen, she was to preside and administer justice at local courts. In the event she fell victim to a fever and nearly died.

Her illness had been brought on after an arduous ride to visit her lover and future husband the Earl of Bothwell at Hermitage Castle. Mary, among other things, always had a fateful capacity to live life on the edge.

She was, literally, a pawn in a game of power politics that played out in Scotland, France and Tudor England; ruthless times indeed.

Awaiting the final chapter at Fotheringhay in 1587, her wistful expression, captured on a wonderful mural by Nottingham artist Jennifer Bell (right), as she watches the grim reeper arriving on a white horse, is an eerie link to her memories of Jedburgh and the famous quote.

The mural graces the restaurant at the exceptional and much recommended Talbot Hotel in Oundle, three miles south of Fotheringhay. The historic coaching inn lays claim to many more links to the ill-fated Mary, including the oak staircase Mary is said to have walked down to her execution ... https://talbothotel.co.uk/

Her brief but eventful stay at Jedburgh, however, served to give this borders town another A-list tourist attraction. The house where she is said to have lodged, a short walk from the Abbey, is now the much visited Mary Queen of Scots Visitor Centre.

The impressive 16-century building belonged to the Kerr family, who lived in nearby Ferniehirst Castle. The house itself has an interesting feature, a left-handed staircase built for the Kerrs in the 16th century, to enable them, as left-

handers, to wield their swords more easily.

Its rooms contain tapestries, oil paintings, furniture, arms and armour and some of Mary's personal possessions. They map out her life from childhood in France, her return to Scotland to reign as Queen, her captivity in England and eventual execution at Fotheringhay.

The Jedburgh display includes a lock of her hair and an unusual painted death mask of Mary.

It was common practice to make a mask from the severed head as soon as possible after death. This example was found by the late Dr Charles Hepburn of Glasgow, in Peterborough where Mary was first buried.


The memorabilia also includes jewellery, documents and a



watch that she lost on her way to see Bothwell; amazingly, retrieved from a hole in the ground some 250 years later.

The painted panel (right) typifies the turbulence that followed Mary through life. It depicts Mary, Lord Darnley her second (murdered) husband, Lord Bothwell (later her third husband) and David Rizzio, her (also murdered) secretary.

Interest in Mary, Queen of Scots has never waned and the centre, opened in 1987 on the 400th anniversary of her death, is rated as one of Scotland's top visitor attractions.



Mary Queen of Scots House



Time to fly the flag!

The countdown begins: can the Scottish Borders become Scotland's next National Park?

Communities and organisations across Scotland are being invited to submit their proposals to become the country's next National Park (NP) – and amongst the first off the mark is the Campaign for a Scottish Borders National Park (CSBNP).

CSBNP already has an independent feasibility study under its belt. The study states – unequivocally - that NP designation has the potential to spark a Borders-wide revival, and how uniting the region's agriculture, tourism, forestry, food and drink, leisure and sporting industries with local communities behind a powerful, internationally recognised brand could transform the region's economy. It would also promote a deeper appreciation of the Scottish Borders' outstanding natural and cultural heritage amongst visitors and local residents alike.

CSBNP has since drawn on the study, and many different stakeholders', feedback to refine a clear vision of how a slimline National Park Authority in the Borders could work in practice – see www.scottishbordersnationalpark.com for our updated proposal, and also CSBNP's review of best practice on visitor management, How to Keep (almost) Everyone in the Countryside Happy.

The Scottish Government (SG) has committed to designating at least one new National Park in Scotland by the end of this parliamentary session in 2026, provided that relevant legal conditions can be met. To meet the criteria, groups must be able to demonstrate:

- Outstanding national importance due to natural or culture heritage
- · A distinctive character and coherent identity
- How National Park status would meet the specific needs of the area
- Evidence of local support for the proposal

Last month, the SG issued detailed guidance for applicants. Now, the CSBNP team is in discussion with SG-appointed communications consultants Lateral North, whose remit is to support any groups interested in applying for NP designation for their area. Time is tight: the deadline for submissions is 29 February 2024. Meantime, the Scottish Borders proposal continues to evolve.



The Scottish Borders offers an unbeatable combination of natural and cultural heritage: rivers, rolling hills, and deep valleys steeped in legend and history, dark skies and awesome vantage points to marvel at our galaxy of stars, ancient woods teeming with wildlife, once-glorious abbeys, hill forts and towers, magnificent great houses, and the unique traditions of the Border reivers, whose ride-outs of hundreds of horsemen are a world class spectacle.


Scotland's two existing National Parks were set up in 2002-3: Loch Lomond & the Trossachs and Cairngorm. As Cairngorms National Park Authority's Sandy Bremner said at the NP application launch: 'This is a great opportunity for communities in Scotland to join the family of National Parks to tackle some of the biggest challenges around nature loss, climate change and community development.

"National Park status can bring enormous benefits to a region. It offers a heightened focus on the protection and enhancement of the area's natural and cultural heritage. It can attract vital support to hard-pressed communities, and bring people together to achieve inspirational change."

The home of a global sporting favourite...

xactly when and where Ned Haig experienced his 'eureka' moment and came up with the idea of seven-a-side rugby seems forever destined to remain lost in the mists of time.

But one thing is certain, the flash of inspiration from the Borders lad working as a butcher's apprentice in Melrose has earned him a seat at the top table of sporting history and a special place in local folklore.

It has also bequeathed a lasting legacy, to Melrose Rugby Football Club, the town and the region, of a magnitude that no one, least of all Ned and his pals, could have dared imagine.

Six years after its inception in 1877 the club found itself somewhat strapped for cash and in desperate need of a decent idea to raise funds. Players and members "for want of money racked their brains" - and, necessity being the mother of invention, along came Ned's brainwave for a sevens rugby tournament.

Reflecting on the first 25 years of sevens success in an article entitled 'An old Melrose Player's Recollections,' written a hundred years ago, Ned explained: "The idea struck me that a



(rugby) football tournament might prove attractive but as it was hopeless to think of having several games on one afternoon with 15 players on each side the teams were reduced to seven."

Simple but absolutely brilliant. Before long sevens rugby had spread far and wide, destined to become an essential and hugely popular part of the game.

The fact that sevens rugby today is played internationally and has its own world cup – teams compete for the Melrose Cup of course - puts Ned shoulder to shoulder with the likes of Charles Alcock, William Lynn and Geo Lefrevre whose efforts gave the world the sporting classics of the FA Cup, the Grand National and the Tour de France respectively.

Every April since 1883, with enforced exceptions brought about by war (and more recently Corona virus), the flags have fluttered enthusiastically at Melrose RFC's Greenyards ground to celebrate the original and most respected sevens tournament in the world of rugby.



...and a local hero forever the "voice of rugby"



I can still hear Bill McLaren's voice now, commentating on one of the internationals (the Five Nations in those days) letting us know that a player was off on a "mazy run."

A finer ambassador for the game of rugby you couldn't hope to meet - and in this, his centenary year, the subject of a special film and exhibition.

Staged at Hawick Museum the commemorative exhibition traced Bill's life from his schooldays in Hawick, a courageous fight to overcome tuberculosis to his time as a PE teacher in Hawick and than a glittering career as a journalist, writer and broadcaster.

The exhibition recreates the organised chaos of Bill's study and his last recorded interview, sharing his ways to prepare for big match commentaries.

Essentially, this honorable 'Terie' - *a native of the borders town of Hawick* - was successful by simply being himself.

And if you missed the exhibition the first time round don't worry; it reopens in March 2024 alongside a new Hawick Rugby Football Club celebration to mark its 150th anniversary. (We'll preview with full details in our February - March issue).

The Bill McLaren exhibition has been made possible by a partnership between the Bill McLaren Foundation, Hawick Ruby Club and Live Borders with support from SSE Renewables and Scottish Borders Council.

A region that's home to inspirational museums

We're lucky to have so many fantastic museums across the Borders.

They're brilliant for young people, families and anyone interested in our wonderful local history.

Recently, I've had the chance to visit just a few of the first-class museums right on our doorstep.

One of those has been the Evemouth Museum, which I visited to commemorate and learn about the historic Evemouth fishing disaster when 189 fishermen drowned in a severe windstorm off the South-East coast of Scotland.

The museum tells the story of Eyemouth through the years, highlighting important milestones including the building of Evemouth Fort in 1547 and the creation of the lifeboat station in 1876.

I found it fascinating to hear about how the local area originated.

Another museum I visited recently only opened this year in Coldstream, the Admiral Ramsay Museum.

It has been established in memory of Admiral Sir Bertram Ramsay, who commanded the Dunkirk evacuation and D-Day landings.

Set up by Admiral Ramsay's grandson, Will, it is a great educational experience about what he achieved during World War Two.

These are just two of the huge diversity of outstanding museums we're blessed with in the

There's also the Trimontium Museum near Melrose, a brilliant resource of Roman artefacts. I was delighted to see the UK Government recently award it with £57,861 to provide the newly refurbished activity space at the museum with virtual reality and digital equipment.

For people more interested in sports, the Jim Clark Motorsport Museum is also well worth a visit. It marks the life of the world champion racing driver who grew up near Duns.

Learning experiences like these museums are great days out for people of

They can help to inspire children, bring families together to engage in fun activities, and give adults a better understanding of our local area.

I hope you consider coming to the Borders to make your own memories at our museums soon.

The venue itself, an early English gothic church with stained glass windows, creates a wonderfully intimate experience with exceptional acoustics due to its high vaulted ceilings.


With a capacity for up to 300 people, bands such as Scouting for Girls to our very own local Patterson have performed here.

Charlie Leckie, brand manager for 1881 Distillery, said: "It's



This spectacular shot by Explore's Steven Somerville captures a fascinating chapter of transport history in the Scottish Borders.

In the foreground is the spectacular Leaderfoot Viaduct built in 1865 and one of two major railway viaducts (the other is at Berwick) serving the region. The line was formally closed in 1965.

In the centre we have the Drygrange Old Bridge - a major north-south river crossing built in 1778-80.

At the top is the modern A68 and the major road route north though the borders to Edinburgh.

For those wanting to take a closer look there's a signed turn-off (northbound) that takes you down to a parking area.

It's just off the Drygrange Old Bridge and well worth the stop.

With this in mind, we've created a handy winter 'bucket list' highlighting attractions businesses and communities told us they want to see prioritised at this time of year.


It captures the enduring charm and beauty of the South of Scotland during the traditionally more challenging 'shoulder months' of the tourist season.



Stow Cycle Hub gaining momentum

The Stow Cycle Hub is a perfect example of how a Community Interest Company (CIC) can succeed and thrive.

And making this happen is bike enthusiast Stephen Riddell and a band of volunteers based in Stow and nearby Fountainhall.

Stephen inspired the community workshop for all things cycling and with support from Stow Community Trust and the supply of a spacious room at the back of the beautifully renovated Stow Railway House the project is growing from strength to strength.

The main part of the handsome Victorian building, threatened with demolition after its decline since the railway closed in 1969, is now a café eatery welcoming locals and passengers from the reopened Edinburgh to Tweedbank Waverley line.

"Cyclists can come along and repair a bike previously ready for the skip and have it in perfect working order within a few weeks", said Stephen.

This goes a step further with pupils from Jedburgh Grammar attending workshops in cycle repair which could ultimately gain them Nat 3 or 4 qualifications.

It's possible to hire conventional or e-bikes there for an hour, a day, a week or longer if you want to take one or two on holiday.

And for details of whether you are eligible for e-bike loan check the Cycle Hub web site.

The Cycle to Health from the Hub on Wednesday mornings is an inspiration as it's literally a prescription for those recovering from illness or surgery.

So what does our enthusiastic spokesman do on his precious days off?



Borders home for national biking hub


A MUCH-ANTICIPATED mountain bike hub at the site of a former Peeblesshire mill will open in 2025.

The innovation centre, with a bike park and trail lab, will be built at Innerleithen's Caerlee Mill, near Glentress.
